Sept. 12 and 13: Mental Health First Aid USA (8-hour course)

How can faculty better recognize the signs and symptoms of mental health challenges? What interventions are appropriate for faculty to deliver and when should students be referred to the counseling center? This 8-hour course gives people the skills to recognize and help students experiencing a mental health crisis. This is a two-part course: participants **must attend** both sessions to obtain a three-year certification. This is a follow-up to the session on Working with Distressed Students (2018 Provost's Diversity Institute for Faculty Development).

Sept. 17: Making Your Digital Course Materials Accessible and Inclusive

Whether you teach a face-to-face or online course, any course content you offer digitally must be accessible to all students, including those with disabilities. This workshop explains what accessibility looks like in the context of CourseWeb and looks at other digital content mediums, why accessibility is important, and how universal design can help all students, not just those with disabilities. NOTE: This workshop may be counted toward the Online Teaching concentration of the Achievement in Pedagogy badge, offered through the Graduate Student Teaching Initiative.

Sept. 25: Enhancing Diversity Practices in Online Courses

In this workshop, you will learn about best practices for integrating diversity concepts into an online course. Using various technologies commonly used in online teaching, you will also learn how to apply inclusivity in your course, including icebreakers, visuals, group activities, discussion forums, and assessment tools.

Sept. 27: Teaching Inclusively

This workshop introduces several principles of inclusivity and offers practical advice for fostering an inclusive university environment through your teaching. Through discussion and workshop exercises, learn how promoting and practicing inclusivity can improve learning outcomes and your relationship with your students, and how the two are closely related. This workshop will also address ways to effectively articulate your philosophy of inclusion in teaching on job applications and in interviews. **NOTE:** This workshop may be counted toward the Diversity concentration of the Achievement in Pedagogy badge, offered through the Graduate Student Teaching Initiative.

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Oct. 9: Four Steps to Engaging Your International Students
